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COURSE OBJECTIVES

The aim of this course is to give the student basic foundational drawing skills. These skills include but are not limited to the choice and use of materials, use of the elements and principles of two dimensional design, and how to record visual thinking. Creative expression and inventive observation is encouraged. This course is a foundation for all areas of the visual arts, and is a beginning course for drawing as an emphasis area.

The sketchbooks may be collected or reviewed anytime during the semester and will be collected for evaluation at the middle and end of the course. They will be graded based upon the quality, ability to

follow direction, and work ethic evident in the submissions included. Make sure multi-page assignments are completed on consecutive pages (do not put some of the work together and then skip some pages and do the rest of the work - you will lose points).

NOTE: I may use images of your work to show as examples of my students' work on my website. I always make sure to give credit to the artist. Please let me know if you do not wish for me to publish your work on the internet.

BLOG

PORTFOLIOS

A portfolio is a collection of your drawings. There will be a mid-term and final portfolio due (exact dates in the class schedule). All work must be cleanly presented, and signed with your name, date, and the assignment title on the back. Criteria for each portfolio will be dispensed near to the date of collection. Be sure to keep all classwork and homework for possible inclusion in the portfolios. All portfolios must have two functioning handles.

DRAWINGS COMPLETED OUTSIDE OF CLASS

Spend at least five hours a week on your homework assignments outside of class (sketchbooks, Homework Drawings, typed responses, etc). Homework assignments will include tasks that will challenge you to apply the skills learned during class to more content-based and completed work. Out of Class Drawings must be on the 18 x 24 drawing paper (not newsprint or butcher paper). Homework Drawings are due at the start of class and must be ready to turn in immediately (no continued working/drawing as roll-call is being taken, or applying fixative/sealer as you walk through the door, etc - this will cause your grade to suffer).
